The lessons are divided into four categories: Religion and the Establishment Clause, Freedom of Expression, Due Process, Other Rights of the Accused, and Equal Protection of the Laws.

The Constitution and the Bill of Rights (8-12)

By the Constitutional Rights Foundation. This CD provides upper elementary and middle grade teachers with a Power Point content presentation and taking points to tell the story of the development of the Constitution and the Bill of Rights. Using animated graphics, the presentation provides a focus discussion, walks students through the creation of the Constitution, and introduces each of the 10 original amendments of the Bill of Rights as well as the later Civil War and 19<sup>th</sup> amendment.

Constitution: A Simulation of a Convention Called to Revise the United States Constitution (10-12)

During a modern constitutional convention, student representatives portray Radicals, Moderates, Conservatives, Minorities, and members of the Anti-President and Big State blocks, as they decide between the needs of their states and the ideologies of their political factions. Proposed amendments on Congressional age limitations, the seniority system, presidential and supreme court powers, and state political restructuring are followed by debate, political bargaining, and a debriefing essay and final test. The 19-page teacher's guide contains reproducible materials.

*The Constitution at 200: Why Does It Still Work? Video (10-12)*

It shows the evolution of the Constitution from historical and political theories on which it is founded to modern interpretations by the Supreme Court. It explores how the Constitution's unique structure meets the needs of our changing nation.

*The Constitution - That Delicate Balance Videos (10-12) 1984*

A video series that examines conflicts between different constitutional rights and principles. Includes Teacher Guide.

- *The Power vs. Congress: Executive Privilege and Delegation of Power*  
Is the President bound by congressional limits he does not choose to honor? What can the congress do if he ignores them? The hypothetical centers on presidential appointees whose view conflict with congressional intentions for their agencies.
- *War Powers: The President and the Congress*

A hypothetical case involving the War Powers Act explores whether the Constitution has or has ever had relevance in the implementation of foreign policy.

- *Presidential Elections, Presidential Succession*  
The program explores the role of political parties in nominating a president, the flexibility of the Electoral College when no candidate is clearly electable, and the government mechanisms set into motion when a president becomes disabled.
- *Criminal Justice and a Defendant's Right to a Fair Trial*  
The right of the accused to a fair trial is weighed against the right of society to take measures assuring public safety in a program which focuses on legal ethics and the Exclusionary Rule.
- *Crime and Insanity*  
A hypothetical political assassination is the vehicle for exploring the insanity defense and the controversy surrounding psychiatric testimony in the courtroom.
- *Crime and Punishment*  
What constitutes cruel and unusual punishment? In this program, the hypothetical from "Crime and Insanity" is expanded to introduce questions about sentencing and the death penalty.
- *Campaign Spending: Money and Media*  
To examine government regulations of the electoral process, we look at attempts to reform campaign financing and the increasing importance of the media in national elections.
- *National Security and Freedom of the Press*  
Does the Constitution grant the American public a "Right to Know?" This program explores the federal government's ability to conduct what it deems an effective foreign policy within a constitutional framework that demands a free, unfettered press.
- *School Prayer, Gun Control, and the Right to Assemble*  
What is the court's role in determining policy on these sensitive issues? This program poses a hypothetical small town beset by First and Second Amendment controversies.
- *The Sovereign Self: Right to Live, Right to Die*  
Personal freedoms and privacy are balanced against state intervention and societal rights in a discussion that touches on abortion, "Baby Jane Doe" cases, and right to die.
- *Immigration Reform*  
The discussion covers criteria for admitting foreigners into the United States, legal aliens' rights to social services, employer's responsibilities in hiring undocumented persons, and the extent to which illegal aliens have rights.
- *Affirmative Action vs. Reverse Discrimination*  
Contemporary society has attempted to redress discriminatory practices with affirmative action programs. This program examines accusations that such programs foster reverse discrimination.

- *Federalism: The National Government vs. The States*  
Can the federal government offer special incentives to local school boards to foster the national good? If so, will the standards it imposes, and may wish to document, lead to meritocracy?

“A Convention of Delegates” A Creation of the Constitution

*Discussion in Bioethics Video (10-12)*

A series of short dramas about: "Death Through Benign Neglect"; "The Right to Refuse Treatment"; "Quality of Care"; Allocation of Scarce Resources"; Prenatal Diagnosis"; "Compulsory Sterilization"; "The Handicapped Newborn"; and "Chemical Warfare." Modern science has given us vast powers to shape human life, but science does not tell us when, how, or why these powers should be used, nor who should make the decisions. By presenting eight situations in an open-ended dramatic format, it stimulates discussion

of ethical, legal, and economic questions raised by the rapid advances in modern science. Discussion guide included.

#### The Constitution: A Cooperative Learning Approach

By D. David Janu. This lesson plan booklet directs students to research the Constitution and then teach the class. Students are even responsible for writing part of the test for the unit, aided by instructions on formulating different types of questions. Activities include “Constitution Scavenger Hunt, and “So You Want to Write Your Own Constitution Test.” Includes handouts and worksheets for each branch of government, the Bill of Rights and other Amendments

#### *Election Process in America: Just the Facts; Video (7-12)*

This program identifies differences among national, state, and local elections; explains how the Electoral College works, and traces the expansion of voting rights to blacks, women, and 18-year-olds. The guide leaflet has objectives, vocabulary, questions, and activities. 49 minutes.

This is one in a series of NewsMatters Programs by Knowledge Unlimited, Inc. This video, which is accompanied by a teacher’s guide, provides the basis for a debate about the Electoral College. Recent presidential elections caused many Americans to question the fairness of the Electoral College and the relevance of a 200-year-old way of electing a president. 18 minutes.

#### *Empire of Reason Video (7-12)*

A contemporary view of the drama and struggle involved in New York’s ratification of the U. S. Constitution in 1788. The film provides viewers with major television personalities presenting the historical events as if they happened today.

By Steve Jenkins and Susan Spiegel. Encouraging students to participate in the lawmaking process, this text explains what laws are, how they function, and who makes them. Short readings are interspersed with activities, in-class exercises such as simulations, role-playing, and writing opinions. A series of activities offers the opportunity to do further research, conduct surveys, and become acquainted with community resources. Among the topics covered are the role of the victim in the judicial system, lobbying, and voting.

### *The Executive Branch* Video (10-12)

In this video, alligator farmers in Florida want to raise American alligators and sell their hides. However, the American alligator was listed as an endangered species. Farmers pushed to have the Florida alligators’ status changed and government regulations adjusted so the hides could be sold. National Geographic.

### *Eyes on the Prize: Episode 1 - Awakenings* Video (10-12)

This six-part series is the most comprehensive television documentary on the American Civil Rights movement ever produced. Through rare historical film and incisive present-day interviews, the events and issues of the second American Revolution came to life. The video focuses on events of 1954-56. The Mississippi lynching of 14-year-old Emmett Till led to a widely publicized trial where a courageous black man took the stand and accused two white men of murder. In Montgomery, Alabama, Rosa Parks refused to yield her bus seat to a white man.

*Eyes on the Prize: Episode 2 - Fighting Back Video (10-12)*

This video follows the struggle for equality from the schoolroom to the courtroom and back, as blacks reject the existing system of “separate but equal” education. In 1954, the Supreme Court also rejects the system in its historical *Brown v. Board of Education* decision. In 1957, nine black teenagers dare to integrate Little Rock’s Central High School. In 1962, a resolute James Merideth enrolls at the University of Mississippi.

*Eyes on the Prize: Episode 3 - Ain’t Scared of Your Jails Video (10-12)*

This episode chronicles the courage displayed by thousands of young people and college students who joined the movement and gave it new direction in 1960. Lunch counter sit-ins spread across the South, many organized by the new, energetic Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee. In 1961, on the freedom rides, many young people faced violence and defied death threats as they labored to obliterate segregation in the interstate bus travel below the Mason-Dixon line. The growing movement toward racial equality influenced the 1960 presidential campaign, and federal versus states rights became an issue.

*Eyes on the Prize: Episode 4 - No Easy Walk 1962-66 Video (10-12)*

This episode explores a crucial phase in the civil rights movement — the emergence of Georgia police chief, Lauri Pritchett, who challenged Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr.’s tactics of nonviolent mass demonstration. In Birmingham, Alabama, school children steadfastly marched against the violent spray of fire hoses and were jailed as a result. The triumphant 1963 march on Washington, D. C., captured worldwide attention and gathered broad national support, helping to shift federal policy.

*Eyes on the Prize: Episode 5 - Mississippi: Is This America? Video (10-12)*

This episode focuses on the extraordinary personal risks faced by ordinary citizens as they assumed responsibility for social change, particularly during the 1962-64 voting rights campaign in Mississippi. The state became a testing ground of constitutional principles as civil rights activists concentrated their energies on the right to vote. White resistance to the sharing of political power clashed with the strong determination of movement leaders to bring Mississippi Blacks to the ballot box. In Freedom Summer 1964, tension between white resistance and movement activists climaxed in the tragic murder of three young civil rights workers.

*Eyes on the Prize: Episode 6 - Bridge to Freedom Video (10-12)*

In this final episode, the lessons of a decade are brought to bear on the 1965 march from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama, when thousands joined together to march 50 miles for freedom. During the drive to make voting rights a national issue, strategic and biological differences began to surface between Dr. Martin Luther King, his SCLC, and the younger activists of SNCC. As “backlash” and segregationists’ resistance intensified, President Lyndon B. Johnson promised to further the movement’s legislative goals. Then, as the movement began to splinter into factions, the Voting Rights Act became federal law.

### Exploring Race and Affirmative Action Video

By the Close-Up Foundation. This video challenges viewers to consider their own ideas and weigh the advantages and disadvantages of affirmative action policies in the United States.

### Family Law (10-12)

This book is about the law of marriage and the family. The book discusses other issues including divorce, custody, adoption, and abuse.

### Federalists and Anti-federalists

Edited by John P. Kaminski and Richard Leffler. This book looks at six issues in the constitutional debate: The House of Representatives, the Senate, the President, the Judiciary, the Bill of Rights, and the Nature of Republican Government.

### The Federalist Papers

By Hamilton, Madison and Jay. Alexander Hamilton, James Madison, and John Jay defend what was in their day a revolutionary charter — The Constitution of the United States. The Federalist Papers explain the complexities of a constitutional government — its political structure and principles based on the inherent rights of man.

### Feiner v. New York Video (10-12)

Story of Irving Feiner who made a speech to a racially mixed crowd on a New York street corner in 1951. Members of the crowd became upset, and the police asked Feiner to stop his speech. He refused and was arrested for disorderly conduct. His subsequent conviction was upheld by the Supreme Court. The Feiner case has not been overruled, but has been criticized by legal commentators. In this film, Irvine Feiner plays himself.

### Finding Common Ground

By the First Amendment Center. This is a First Amendment Guide to Religion and Public education. This book affirms teaching about religion and the vital importance of protecting the liberty of conscience of students of all faiths or none in the spirit of the First Amendment.

### “The First Amendment: America’s Blueprint for Tolerance”

- 1992 *People v. Mitchell*. Mock trial competition centering around issues of responsible driving and alcohol. This trial also features a substantive constitutional issue about citizens' Fourth Amendment rights. Once the constitutional issue is decided, students conduct a criminal trial on the charge of driving under the influence and hit and run. Guaranteed to make students think about the dangers of drinking and driving and the legal issues that arise as a result.

In the second part, real-life trial attorney Elliot Glicksman walks viewers through constitutional issues that arose in the trial, and raises thought-provoking questions about the rights of defendants that provide excellent stimulus for classroom discussion. Finally, students role play and conduct a mock trial of their own. Teacher guide included.
